Nothing. That's what it cost Immaculate Conception Catholic Church, a southeastern Virginia parish, to install the 440 panels of its new solar energy system. The system will generate 100% of the parish's energy use from the sun. Immaculate Conception is the first parish to complete a solar project with the Catholic Energies program of the Catholic Climate Covenant. The shift from fossil fuels carries weight in a coastal area that is highly vulnerable to tidal flooding worsened by climate change.

Churches wipe out millions in medical debt for others Medical debt drives two-thirds of bankruptcies. But churches of various Christian denominations across the country have found a way to apply donations in the thousands to clear debt in the millions. The nonprofit RIP Medical Debt uses donor money to buy debt portfolios for pennies on the dollar — and then forgives the debt.
