Israeli apartheid

The "animus" justly directed at Israel is due to its overtly inhuman, vicious, and wanton cruelty and apartheid ("Michael Sean Winters on the glad tidings from Syria,"

emailed by NCR, <u>Dec. 10, 2024</u>). Palestinian suffering and humiliation have been going on for decades. Israeli "settlers" even <u>today</u> walk in and take over a Palestinian house at will. Palestinians have restricted areas in which they may walk or enter. This is no different from South Africa prior to 1994.
